What Does Disaster Giving Look Like?


In the U.S., disaster giving is quick and largely reactive:

- 1-4 weeks following a disaster: Over a third of private giving is completed
- **1-2 months** following a disaster: Two-thirds of private giving is completed
- After 6 months: Almost all giving stops

Yet recovery takes years . . .








What Does Disaster Giving Look Like?

> 80% of individual donations arrive within days after disaster strikes




All Funders are Disaster Funders

- Children/Education
